DISMAS HOUSE DINNERS: A NEW YEAR, A NEW APPROACH!



Our small but faithful "army" of Dismas Dinner cooks put our heads together recently and came up with a few ideas about what might be getting in the way of folks raising their hands and volunteering to make a "dish for Dismas." (continued on the next page)

Have you ever thought:

- 1) I don't understand why we make meals for the residents there?
- 2) I'm not comfortable with the idea of sharing a meal with a group of strangers?
- 3) I don't know what they like so I don't know what to make?

Let's take them one by one.

Why is easy! Here's a quote from the Dismas of Vermont website:

Life at Dismas House follows the natural rhythms of family life. During the day, Dismas residents go to work and/or to school. In the evening, everyone shares the evening meal. Afterward they might attend 12 step meetings, study, help with chores, prepare for the next day, reconnect with their families, relax, or socialize. The evening meal is the centerpiece of the day where community building takes place. One of the chief ingredients is the presence of our volunteer cooks. As they come month after month, they become an important part of the Dismas community. If the residential community and staff can be likened to the nuclear family, the volunteer cooks are the extended family: cousins, aunts, uncles, etc.

Sharing the meal is not a requirement of making a dish! In fact, during COVID we've just been dropping the dishes off on the Dismas House back



porch. But what the Union Church "regulars" will tell you is that sharing the meal together is the best part of our outreach there and it's what we miss the most. As in any new situation, you might feel awkward at first; but soon, like when most friends and families gather for a meal, there's a sharing of plans and experiences, stories are told, and laughter rings out. Before you know it, the meal is over (those guys don't mess around when it comes to eating!), the residents have cleared the dishes and are in the kitchen putting away the food and cleaning up. Some stay around the table just to chat with us some more, and all express their gratitude for what we've brought.

Lastly, who <u>doesn't</u> love a home-cooked meal? Truly, *any* dish you might want to contribute to the monthly meal is welcomed by the guys at Dismas House. As long as we provide variety in what we bring, there will always be something appealing. The staff informs us ahead of time about how many residents they have and if there are any allergies.

That said, we thought we'd try and address the, "I don't know what to make," question by presenting a menu each month. The "what" will have already been worked out. That just leaves the "who"... and we hope it's YOU!

Don't forget that January 9, 2022, will be the last service that John Sanborn will be preaching with us. We all hope that he enjoys his upcoming retirement.


