Thanks to everyone for your contributions and for your help sorting the boxes and cans.



OPEN DOOR MISSION

On Saturday night (2/11/17), 6 volunteers from our Church, went to the Open Door Mission to serve dinner at 6:00PM. We have signed on to continue do so, on the 4th Saturday of every month. What a great opportunity for our Church to serve the less fortunate. In the words of Christ (as part of Matthew 25:40) Christ said: "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the

least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me". After a little research, I was amazed with what the Open Door Mission is able to accomplish <u>WITHOUT</u> public funds, with help from many others in the community, like us. I'm sharing the information with you, as I thought you might find it of interest as well.

Here's some info for you:

OPEN DOOR MISSION

- 1) We receive NO public dollars
- 2) We are a 51 bed shelter. The largest in the State.
- 3) First Long-Term Veteran Shelter in the Country
- 4) 16,000 bed nights, last year, in our shelter
- 5) Our Soup kitchen served over 36,000 meals last year
- 6) We help clothe, not just the homeless, but also the working poor. We help hundreds of families at Christmas each year
- 7) We give our homeless veterans a warm bed, a full belly, and a shoulder to cry on, when needed. We help them transition back into a better quality life. 87% of our clientele are veterans

What supports us

- a) About 80% comes from our thrift store
- b) The other 20% comes from our once-ayear Golf Tournament, and our Annual appeal

Last year it cost us approx. \$500,000 to support all these things, as well as fuel, electric, etc. <u>DONE WITH NO PUBLIC FUNDS</u>
