"SPRING" WINDOWS HAVE BEEN SPRUNG!

Even on an overcast day, the bright light now streaming around the piano in the sanctuary is astounding...with good reason! The



"Spring" windows were the last Tiffany Studios stained-glass windows to be installed in the Union Church sanctuary, but were actually the first to be removed recently for restoration.

The windows, with their sheltering tree, riot of flowers in the foreground and majestic mountains in the distance, were installed in 1930 in memory of Minnie E. (Mrs. Fletcher) Proctor, by her children. Unfortunately, upon inspection,

consultant, Tim Byrne of New England Art Glass, deemed the "Spring" windows to be the most in need of repair,

On the last Saturday in March, Tim and his friend, Randy, made the nearly 3-hour trip down from Tim's studio while Tim's colleague, Dave, drove to Proctor all the way from Maine. They were met by Barbara, and, thank goodness (but more on that later....), several men of the church.

Then the "fun" began. A specially made plywood box with locking lid was carefully laid across the tops of the choir's pews. One, and later, two ladders went up. Slowly and carefully, Tim and Dave eased the molding from around the first window. Each thin, metal "twist tie" holding the five horizontal rods was then undone. The rods themselves popped out from the plaster sides like an old-fashioned toilet paper holder.

While it now seemed like the window should easily tip out onto a waiting piece of plywood, this was not the case! Over 90 years of plaster and paint still held the heavy glass fast. Moving from crowbar to putty knife to utility knife, Tim and his crew painstakingly chipped away at each small "catch." Deep breaths and, no doubt, a heartfelt prayer or two, and finally the beautiful window was free!

But then as we watched with dismay, it started to fold, top to bottom, as it came away from the opening. This is where our guys - Jeff Bergquist, Bill Sheidow, Paul Sutherland, and Bruce Baccei came to the rescue either holding ladders, steadying/carrying the heavy window, directing it into the box, gently slipping out the plywood, and/or carefully folding the padding around the window. An hour and a half of tremendous patience paid off with lots of sighs of relief, lots of smiles.

We church folks thought Tim and crew must have had more than enough "excitement" for one day. Nope! They decided to attempt the second "Spring" window while they were down this way. Thankfully, in less than half the time, the second window had practically popped out of it's opening. In no time it was safely tucked away with its partner window and the heavy box was headed down the center aisle and into Tim's truck bed.



Some interesting tidbits:

**Tim visited his wife's grandparents in Proctor many times over the years. Her grandfather was a craftsman for Vermont Marble. Tim and Bruce had quite a nice chat about all of the Proctor connections they have in common.

**While Tim knew that the windows were "...like having 3 different multi piece windows stacked on top of each other [with] hundreds of pieces to each layer," what he learned once the windows were out, was that Tiffany Studios had added another layer of glass behind the first three to diffuse the light. That certainly didn't make the windows any lighter, though!

**Once back in his shop, Tim discovered that the wax pencil marks put on the glass some 92 years ago by the Tiffany shop foreman were still visible. The marks were to tell someone where to etch the glass. In Tim's words, "This is awesome." Yes, it is.

**What is also awesome is that due to the diligent work Karen Webster did organizing our church records, Paul was able to easily lay his hands on the church's correspondence with Tiffany Studios over 100 years ago. Tim was thrilled to see them.

**Finally, be sure to check out the large "Tiffany Windows" book, a gift to Union Church from Tim Byrne, on the back table in the sanctuary. Our windows are in there!

To the Union Church of Proctor members for



your generous contributions made during the second quarter of 2022! The Outreach Committee, because of your support, was able to send two checks of \$1000 each to Ukraine which is suffering unimaginable losses due to the ongoing Russian invasion.

The first check was sent to Church World Service Crisis Response Fund. It will help cover the necessary daily needs of the Ukraine people. The second check of \$1000 was sent in direct response to a plea from Ukraine doctors who are in desperate need of medical equipment. This will help enable them to perform daily life-saving surgeries. The equipment is being purchased in Poland and Germany and sent across the borders directly to the hospital.

The next two checks mailed out, addressed our "closer to home" organizations which provide a helping hand to those who are food insecure and those who need assistance making a fresh start. The Pittsford Food Shelf, serving the towns of Pittsford, Proctor, Florence and Chittenden, received its monthly donation of \$500. The Rutland Dismas House also received a check of \$500 which enable those people, transitioning from incarceration, to return to the general population.

The Outreach Committee will formally meet again on July 12th at 1:00 pm in the Parish House to manage the list of requests for the third quarter.
